Dear Members of the Metro Board,

As a frequent Metro train and bus rider and a biker, I am writing to urge you to protect job standards and fair working conditions for the union workers who have built the Metro Bike Share System. I ask you not just to extend the current Bike Share Contract, but also to disqualify Lyft from the bidding process now and in the future. Our union workers have stated over and over again that they do not wish to work for Lyft, a non-union company that does not prioritize public transit. They believe job quality will suffer, and for good reason.

Lyft has a long history of working counter to the interests of a functioning, robust, public transit system. Studies have indicated that the rise of ride-hailing services like Lyft has been linked to a decrease in bus and rail ridership in major American cities. In San Francisco, Lyft funded opposition and successfully killed Proposition L, which would have provided crucial funding for Muni by taxing ride-hailing companies. Lyft's opposition to such initiatives reveals a commitment to prioritizing its own profits over the well-being of our public transit infrastructure.

Additionally, according to TWU 320 members in various cities, since Lyft decided to insert themselves into the Micromobility industry they have compromised the integrity of the labor force representing the TWU Local 320 union members - removing and outsourcing jobs, reducing shifts and working hours, and requiring the use of apps that negatively impact workers.

In light of recent allegations against Lyft, we urge you to disqualify them from the current bidding process and to choose the operator that workers support. Bicycle Transit Systems has proven themselves to be a pro-worker, community-oriented company with ample experience in the bike share industry.

Since 2016, BTS has helped build Metro Bike Share into a nationally recognized program, with over 3 million rides and nearly 8 million pounds of CO2 reduced. BTS has been a collaborative partner, working hand-in-hand with community groups to ensure that bike share expands access and centers equity.

Awarding the Bike Share Contract to Lyft funnels more funds to an organization that has a track record of advocating against public transit and operating counter to the interests of unionized, transit workers. Los Angeles residents and Metro riders deserve more than investing in a company that is not invested in truly improving public transit, but instead benefits when riders opt-out of public transit all together.

Please disqualify Lyft from the bidding process to ensure that our public services will be run

My name is Sergeant Dr. Jaquel J. Pitts, Ph.D. I am a security guard employed by a third party security company. This hereby serves as a complaint against a LA METRO officer who was a African American male who illegally searched my property and belongings at a security checkpoint without my consent at the Compton station at the entrance of the station. This incident occurred at the entrance of Compton station between 10:05am and 10:11am on July 7 2025. Lately LA METRO has been instituting security checkpoints and metal detectors and they have been searching all the patrons who visit certain stations such as Norwalk Station and Compton Station . These searches consists of LA METRO officers going through all incoming patrons and people's bags purses and personal belongings and demanding that they empty their pockets. During the incident I was wearing a black beanie that said SECURITY on it. Black hoodie that said security and black sweatpants that said US army on it, and I was wearing black tennis shoes. I'm a African American male 6'0 200lbs

THIS IS A VIOLATION OF THE FOURTH AMENDMENT

PLUS I AM A SECURITY GUARD WHO IS AUTHORIZED TO CARRY WEAPONS

So what are you going to do if a third party security guard is on his way to work carrying a weapon, who does not have a car? Are you going to tell him he can't carry his weapon?

LA METRO IS NOT A FEDERAL AGENCY!

The institution of security checkpoints that involve searching bags, purses, and belongings without reasonable suspicion and probable cause that force universal search and seizure

to all patrons who enter the station is UNCONSTITUTIONAL and a violation of the FOURTH AMENDMENT.

Yes, it is generally illegal for law enforcement to search items and belongings without probable cause. The Fourth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution protects individuals from unreasonable searches and seizures, requiring law enforcement to have a warrant or probable cause (and potentially other exceptions) before conducting a search.

Here's a more detailed explanation:

Fourth Amendment Protection:

The Fourth Amendment protects individuals from unreasonable searches and seizures, meaning the government (including law enforcement) cannot search your property or take your belongings without a good reason.

Probable Cause Requirement:

Generally, law enforcement needs a warrant to conduct a search. To obtain a warrant, they must demonstrate probable cause, which is a reasonable belief that a crime has been committed and that evidence of that crime is likely to be found in the place to be searched.

Exceptions:

There are exceptions to the warrant requirement, such as when the person being searched gives consent, when there is a legitimate emergency, or when evidence is in plain view. However, even in these situations, the search must still be reasonable.

Consequences:

If a search is conducted without probable cause or a valid warrant (and without a recognized exception), the evidence obtained from that search may be inadmissible in court.

My name is Alanna McBirney, and I am representing the owner and management group of the Million Dollar Theater in Downtown LA.

We desperately need the Metro Bike Share station on Broadway & 3rd Street to be relocated away from the front of the Million Dollar Theater. For more than three years, we have been reaching out to stakeholders, policy makers, and public officials to try to get this bike share station relocated, including LADOT's bike share program manager, Metro, the Downtown LA Neighborhood Council, and Council District 14. A formal letter was submitted by DLANC to CD14 back in 2022 with no response, and it has been only empty promises since then.

Most recently, in October, LADOT and Metro handed out a physical flyer notifying the public that the Metro Bike Share would be moved by one block. See copy attached. Staff told us it would be relocated by the "end of the year" – it is now halfway through the following year.

These bike stalls are a modern eyesore, incompatible with the theater's status as a Historic Cultural Monument, and totally unavoidable when photographing and filming the theater façade. No other theater in the Historic Broadway Theater District has this burden, and we are losing upwards of a quarter million dollars (\$250,000) annually due to the presence of these bicycles. This is critical revenue that we could be using to make improvements and maintain the property.

We have proposed multiple alternative location options that all fit within Metro's guidelines for locating these bike racks in a safe and accessible location for users. It is extremely disappointing that we have a Historic property being diminished by these bike racks that could easily, effectively, and safely be relocated.

Overall, we are extremely involved in our community and want to see the revitalization of the Million Dollar Theater and the greater historic Broadway corridor. Please let us know how you can help and if we can assist with any further information to get this done once and for all.

Dear Metro Board,

I am writing to express great disappointment and my dismay that Metro defaulted to planting London Plane trees at the new Purple subway stop on Wilshire/Fairfax, across from LACMA, and at Wilshire/La Brea, located in the Miracle Mile and in CD-5. I also note that the Wilshire/La Cienega stop, in Beverly Hills, has been planted with Fern Pines.

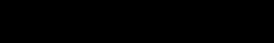
For years, our local group, comprised of engaged neighbors with professional expertise in plants and horticulture, landscape design, and climate change, along with members of the city's Community Forestry Advisory Committee, have been advocating for a coordinated street tree plan along Wilshire Blvd. and tributaries for First/Last Mile, including the two new subway stops. Metro started public outreach in our neighborhoods well before the pandemic, and we participated in meetings, surveys, listening sessions, inter-active phone apps, and more. For years, we communicated with Metro officials, Urban Forestry Division, and our council offices. None of this effort seems to have mattered or amounted to anything.

We are seeking a robust street-tree and landscaping plan that brings year-round shade for cooling, improved health, and delight and beauty for commuters and visitors to this prominent and historical thoroughfare. Better trees choices would be California natives and species that improve our ecology and are in sync with our wet and dry seasons and tell a distinct story connected to this location. Inspiration could have come from the many trees in the LA Brea Tar Pits location. Even Metro's own policies include the preference for native trees and working together with the community!

Instead, we got London Planes. London Plane is one of the most common street trees in the world and certainly still is in Los Angeles. We already have several near the Peterson Museum and Academy Museum -- and these trees look sickly and scrawny. They are deciduous, so we miss the shade for many months, but even when leafed out, they look unhealthy. Maybe they need more water. There are a few London Planes in the area from 50-60 years ago -- and they periodically fall over and regularly need dead-wooding to prevent branches from falling. Less than 10 years ago, we were all in a panic about the shot hole borer pest decimating London Planes and Sycamores. Why are we planting more of the same? We should be planting trees that will thrive for the next 100 years, while the city densifies and builds up around the new subway stops and increases the heat island here.

We have endured many years of living with Metro construction and its impacts, with blocks of emptied buildings, suffering businesses, re-routed traffic, and crumbling sidewalks and debris. Blocks of Wilshire have been a no-man's land. We've been holding out with hope, not expecting the status quo and what feels like disregard, frankly, for what happens to also be our neighborhood streets where we live. This could have been a model planting -- educational and inspirational and hospitable to all the users of the new subway and visitors to the major museums, plus enticing neighborhood residents from their cars. What a missed opportunity for Wilshire Blvd. and the City of Los Angeles at this prominent location on this iconic Los Angeles boulevard.

Our community group is absolutely still available and eager to meet with the parties that decide what tree species get planted and where. We still have the whole of the First/Last Mile pathway network in need of the right shade trees that will define this area -- a once in a lifetime opportunity and possibly for the next 100 years. We ask to meet and work together with Metro, Urban Forestry Division, and our council office to go in a new direction, even at this 11th hour.

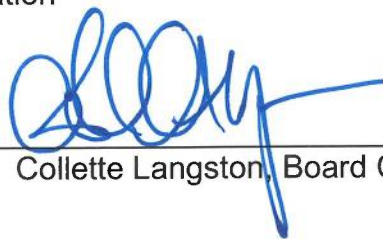

Hello LA Metro. My name is Faraz, and I'm a resident of Downey who plans to use public transit to attend different 2028 Olympic Games events. One important thing that's missing from the 2028 Olympic Mobility Plan is there's no transit plan for reaching the Surfing Event at Trestles Beach in San Clemente. I understand that Metrolink will be handling the public transit to the event since the nearest rail station is at the San Clemente Pier (limited service), which is about a 3.5 miles walking distance to Trestles Beach. But since LA Metro is working/collaborating with Metrolink, then I ask that you please make sure that there is a Transit First option to reach Trestles Beach.

One of the best ideas I think would work is making a temporary Metrolink station at Trestles Beach since the Metrolink rail line already runs directly into Trestles Beach. There's even an area where the tracks are at-grade at the Trestles Beach Trail (near the Trestles Bridge) that just needs the train to stop at and allow passengers/athletes to disembark at. From there, the Trestles Beach Surfing event would be within walking distance.

Another idea is providing a dedicated shuttle service from the San Clemente Pier station so that it can get attendees closer to Trestles Beach. Although I have to warn Metrolink that I've been hearing from those more familiar with the beach area that shuttles and cars are not able to get close enough to drop off attendees at Trestles Beach (which means attendees will still have to walk far to get to Trestles Beach).

And I have to warn Metrolink/LA Olympic 2028 officials that should they fail to provide reliable public transit services to this event, you will force attendees/surfing enthusiasts to have to drive as close as possible to Trestles Beach. And after I've seen the satellite images of Trestles Beach, there's no way this area can hold the expected thousands of in-person attendees, so many drivers will have to park within San Clemente's residential neighborhoods and cause a huge parking crisis (which I fear will still not be enough to house all the attendees' parked cars).

Therefore, I do believe as part of this event's transportation plan, there should be a complete ban of cars entering/exiting San Clemente (unless you prove you're a resident) and the only way to attend the Surfing event is if you take a Metrolink train to Trestles Beach. Plus, if Metrolink/LA Olympics 2028 does this, it'll deter attendees from having to walk/cross over Metrolink tracks (after they park their cars) in order to reach Trestles Beach since the tracks are in the way.

Again, just something I wanted to bring to LA Metro's attention so they can work with Metrolink to prepare ahead of time. Thank you for your time in reading this.

Dear Chair Dutra and Members of the Board:

We are submitting this general comment on Agenda Item #18 as the Los Angeles County Electric Truck and Bus Coalition (LACETBC). Our coalition is composed of environmental, environmental justice, and labor advocates including Earthjustice, Sierra Club, Jobs to Move America, East Yard Communities for Environmental Justice, and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Local 11. Our coalition is committed to achieving zero-emission bus (ZEB) and truck adoption with robust workforce standards so that our communities can breathe clean air and enjoy family-sustaining, high-wage careers.

As Metro continues to work on building up the Games Enhanced Transit Service (GETS) Bus Fleet in preparation for the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games, we urge Metro to work with local utilities and other stakeholders to use the Games as a catalyst for electric bus deployments and infrastructure build out. Only 3% of the transit buses on the road today are ZEBs, and only 12% of the fleet is expected to be electric by 2028. Notably, in 2017 the Board set a goal to get to 100% ZEBs by 2030. We need to get back on track toward our transit bus electrification goals, and the 2028 Games provide a once-in-a-generation opportunity to achieve this while delivering legacy benefits for Angelenos.

Electric buses will clean up Los Angeles's dangerous air pollution, saving people's lives while safeguarding our climate. Emissions from combustion buses are not only bad for our planet, they're bad for our health. Tailpipe exhaust from buses rolling through our communities contributes to air pollution that causes asthma, bronchitis, cancer, and even early death. Public transit riders are especially at risk. Shifting to electric buses will cut pollution and clean up our neighborhoods. Beyond air quality benefits, ZEBs will bring substantial improvements to

communities: they're quiet, reducing noise impacts in our neighborhoods and delivering better experiences for riders and drivers.

More than ever, Angelenos need action to reduce pollution. As Los Angeles recovers from the devastating wildfires in January, we need to build a better and more resilient city.¹ And as the second-largest transit agency in the country, Metro can play a key role as a market mover while addressing Los Angeles's air quality crisis and creating good jobs for working families in the region. The GETS Bus Fleet will be the largest transit bus fleet in the nation, and the 2028 Games are expected to bring 700,000 additional bus passengers to the region during the time of year when our air quality is at its worst. With less than three years until the Games, there's no time to wait.

Our coalition has been meeting with Metro over the last year to discuss our bus electrification progress, and we have appreciated the enhanced communication and collaboration. We are also grateful for the dedicated staff at Metro who are doing this work every day to make the ZEB transition successful. What better way to broadcast excellence in technology than by adopting the same ambitions as peer cities who have hosted major worldwide sports events? Without more aggressive action, Los Angeles will fall behind host cities like Tokyo, Beijing, Paris, and Milan, all of whom electrified or are on track to electrify at least half their bus fleets before hosting the Games.² **We must be more ambitious and show leadership when we are on the world stage in 2028.**

Metro can and must meet this moment with a forward-looking and bold plan to electrify our transit buses. **That means deploying at least 1,175 electric transit buses and electrifying seven Metro divisions by the 2028 Games.** Metro must execute on a large enough procurement to create a manufacturing hub in Los Angeles. The infrastructure build out must also move in tandem. The GETS Bus Fleets, as well as the property leases and investments to support the Games, provide a unique opportunity to rapidly advance electrification without disruption. With contingency fleet buses already starting to arrive, the moment to take action is now. Our window is rapidly closing, and we cannot afford to miss this moment.

Let's seize this opportunity to catalyze increased electric bus deployments so we can get ZEBs on the road, build the infrastructure we need to support the transition, create good manufacturing jobs, and foster legacy benefits for the Los Angeles region.

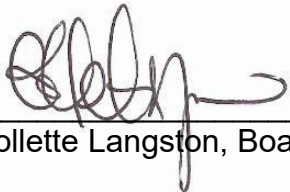
